Designed to introduce parents/caregivers to the transition process.

Year 7 Orientation Days

Two days have been scheduled:

Each student will be allocated **one** of the following sessions based on the primary school they currently attend. Allocated list on page 48.

Students need to bring their morning tea, lunch and a water bottle labelled with their name. They are also required to wear their primary school uniform and school hat.

On this day students will meet other new students and teachers, take a tour of the College and become involved in the community.

2027 Welcome to CMC Day One - Full formal uniform

(Wednesday 27 January 2027 8:30am - 2:54pm)

This day will consist of:

Students and parents/caregivers to arrive between 8.00am - 8.30am.

Welcome coffee/tea available for parents/caregivers.

Students begin the orientation phase about daily routines and procedures at the College.

2027 Welcome to CMC Day Two - Full formal uniform

(Thursday 28 January 2027 8:30am - 2:54pm)

Students to participate in rotational activities guided by their Home Room Teacher and Student Mentors who will be able to provide advice and guidance about the College and daily routines. College photos are scheduled.

Timetable

During the first few days at school in 2027 the students will receive a copy of their timetable. A copy will be provided for their diary and for their locker. The timetable contains all of the class details, including the teacher and classroom.

As part of the Transition Program, the students will spend time learning to understand their timetable. The timetable is a two week rotation of Weeks A and B. The roll is marked in every lesson.

Study and Homework

Homework at Clairvaux MacKillop College refers to all schoolwork undertaken by students outside of normal classroom lessons. There are three types of homework:

Short term homework

This is work set by the subject teacher and may involve day to day tasks, exercises, revision and preparation for future lessons.

Longer term homework

This is work set by the subject teacher to complete research assignments, projects, general reading and exam preparation.

Independent homework

This is work initiated by the students in the pursuit of a subject related interest through wider reading, additional exercises, tasks and research.

Students in Year 7, on average are advised to spend **1 hour each night** on study/homework.

The College supports the students by offering a homework and tuition support program. Please refer to page 36.

Important tips regarding homework and assignments are outlined in the Student Diary. Students will receive their Diary at the beginning of 2027.



A Day in the Life of a Year 7 Student

Starting Time

Students are required to be at the College by 8.20am and be ready to move into their Home Room class, starting at 8.32am.

By arriving at school prior to the starting time, students will be able to unpack their bags, tidy their lockers and prepare books for the first lesson of the day. We strongly encourage this routine at the beginning of Year 7, and indeed, for all students.

Home Room Class

Students move into Home Room class where they are greeted by their Home Room Teacher.

The Home Room will begin with:

- prayer, and
- reading of notices relevant to students. The notices outline upcoming events or daily aspects of College life.



Home Room classes then engage in activities aimed at strengthening the relationships within this group of students.

Readiness for Lessons

- Lessons begin with the sound of a bell or soft music. Students are given adequate time to walk to their timetabled class. As the students arrive at the classroom, they are required to line up outside the classroom awaiting the teacher for that lesson.
- After Morning Tea and Lunch breaks, students collect from their lockers their College Diary, College laptop and books for the upcoming lesson/s and take all of these items with them to class.

Subject Bags

Year 7 students will be introduced to subject bags and will use these bags in Years 7 and 8. These bags are colour coded to match the subject titles printed on their timetable. There are 6 bags in total – English, Mathematics, Science, Religious Education, Humanities and Electives. These bags help with identification and organisation to ensure that all necessary books and supplies are self contained and easily identified.

The Mentor Program

Student Mentors from Year 10 will be here for our Year 7 students to welcome them to the College and assist them with the transition process.

A Student Mentor will be assigned to each Home Room and will help the students find their way around the College and get organised with a daily routine.

Attributes required of a Student Mentor:

- Act as a **role model** for other students in all aspects of life including behaviour, uniform, academic engagement, and right relationships with others.
- An ability to **communicate effectively** with students, staff and parents/ caregivers in order to follow directions and achieve positive outcomes with all stakeholders.
- **Be a team member and support** other members of the student leadership team and Home Room teachers.
- Support the **ethos/identity of the Catholic School** including inclusiveness, authenticity, right relationships, sacramentality of life, and the common good.
- Demonstrate **school spirit** in all facets of college life; academic, arts, culture, sport, and faith life of the college.
- Is influential in **motivating students** to participate in activities and events.





Computers

The College is committed to effective teaching and learning practices which are supported by the appropriate use of technology.

All students will be provided with a laptop, which remains the property of Clairvaux MacKillop College and is replaced every three years.

This resource is fully supported by a level of warranty, ADP (Accidental Damage Protection) insurance and technical assistance from the CMC Connect team. During the year should there be any damage to a student's laptop, documentation will be forwarded home for signing and a small administration fee is charged. Once the fee is paid, a hotswap device is provided until the student's laptop is repaired. Although Dell provides **one ADP claim each 365 days**, since the last claim, if Dell deems the damage to the device was intentional or caused by an act of God, they will not provide ADP and you will be responsible for the cost of repair. If the laptop requires additional repairs in any one year, you will also be responsible for the cost of repair.

Parents/caregivers and students will be asked to sign a laptop agreement, prior to your student receiving their laptop. An information booklet outlining the usage, care and repair of these devices, can be found on our website. A form will be forwarded to parents in the week commencing 11 January 2027 with a link to the information booklet and a request to read and agree to the technology agreement and discuss it with their students. This form will be due by Tuesday 19 January 2027.

All students who's family have returned the form will be given their laptop on Day 1.

Students will be asked to sign an agreement to take care of their device and use it correctly when they receive it.

Information sessions regarding computer navigation and policies will occur during the Year 7 Welcome days in 2027.

Text Books

Students will receive a mixture of hard copy textbook and eText resources. Students are encouraged to use their eText resources for homework/ assignments to minimise the amount of books that they need to transport to and from school each day.



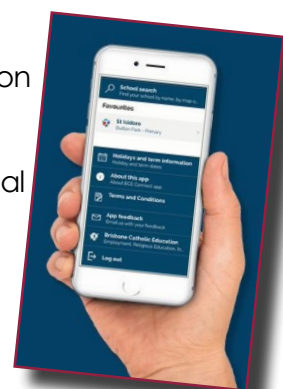
Communication

1. BCE Connect Online and BCE Connect App

The BCE Connect Online is a website consisting of key parent information and engagement opportunities at our school. It is closely integrated with the BCE Connect Mobile application to provide parents with this valuable information in a mobile application. Access is restricted to legal guardians. Log in is via your email address registered with the College. Access for new parents will not be available until mid January 2027.

- Paperless permission forms - View and complete InForm slips.

2. The College Newsletter

Every fortnight on Friday the College will electronically publish a Newsletter. This provides parents/caregivers with latest news, updates and events occurring at the College.

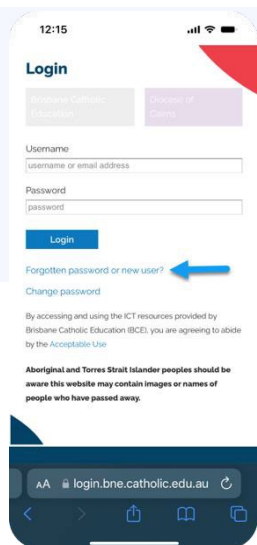
New Users Guide

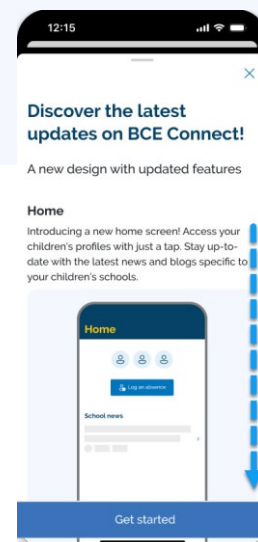

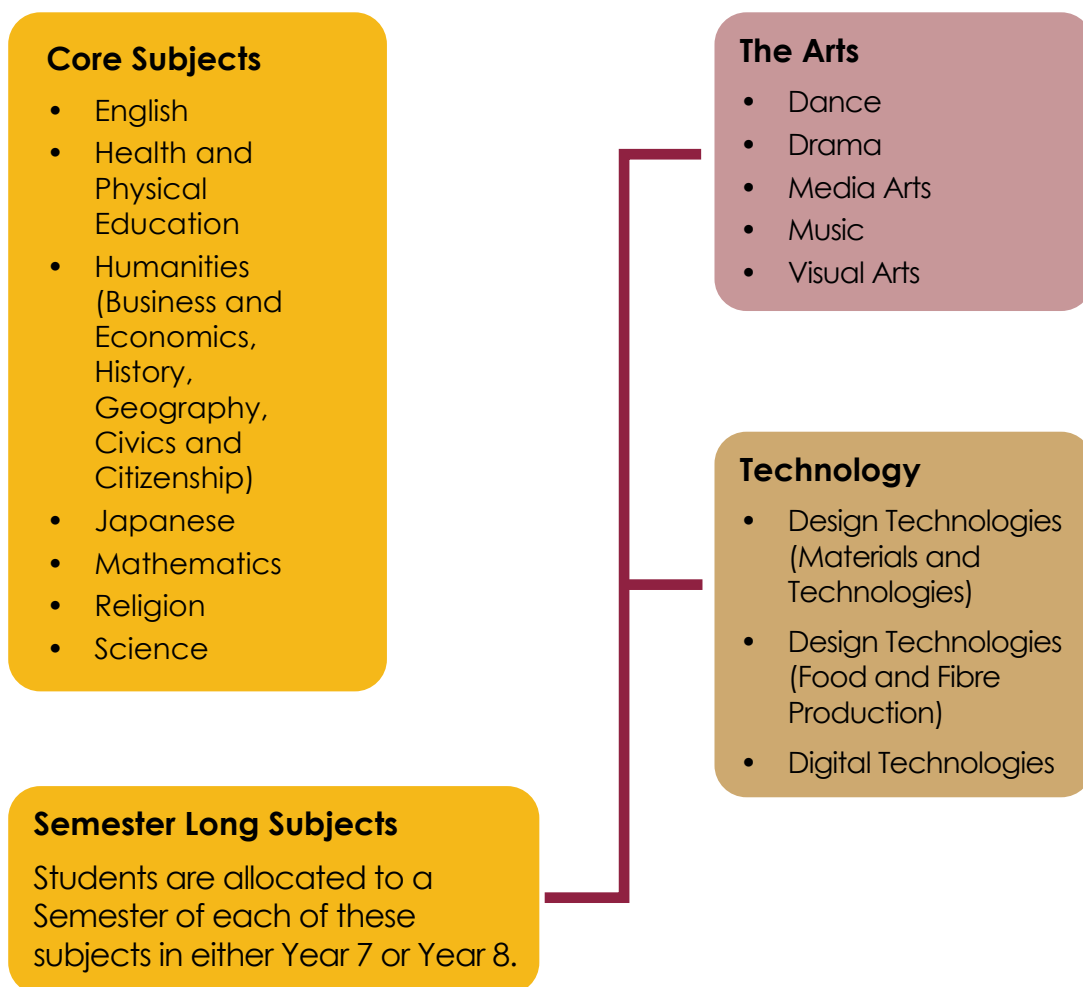

Curriculum

Our Year 7 and 8 students experience an exciting and diverse range of subjects in the Australian Curriculum.

Subjects Offered



2027 Year 7 and 8 Semester Long Subjects

Students will experience a range of Arts and Technology Australian Curriculum subject offerings throughout Year 7 and 8.

A brief overview of each of our subject offerings is on the following page.



Year 7 and 8 Australian Curriculum - The Arts

DANCE

In Year 7/8 Dance we learn popular movement from different decades ranging from the 50s to today. We explore the unique learning style and class structure of Dance highlighting the importance of Safe Dance Practice.

Students will participate in practical classes, and work through a booklet about the different genres of dance, as well as devising their own choreography.

DRAMA

In Year 7/8 Drama we collaborate to devise, interpret and perform drama.

With a focus on bringing drama to life, students explore the elements of drama to create dramatic action and meaning, through Improvisation, Role Play and Script.

MEDIA ARTS

In Year 7/8 Media Arts we learn how to construct representations of heroes and villains, and media editing tools to create meaning. Students produce news stories using cameras and editing software.

MUSIC

In Year 7/8 Music we explore a range of performing and composing activities. Students learn to play the guitar and keyboard, experiment with sound and compose using music software on computers.

We listen to a variety of music, then analyse and evaluate how music impacts on the way we interpret our world.

VISUAL ARTS

In Year 7/8 Visual Arts we explore a range of painting and drawing techniques to create personal maps.

Students learn basic appraising skills by analysing and evaluating an art work using the elements and principles of art and design.

Year 7 and 8 Australian Curriculum - Technology

DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGIES

(Materials and Technologies Specialisations)

Design and Technologies (Materials and Technologies Specialisation) is focused on Year 7 and 8 students using design thinking and the design process to solve problems. Students will use a range of tools and basic machinery to create ideas and products that are purposefully designed to make the future a better place

DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

Dive into the exciting world of Digital Technologies! In this course, you'll uncover the secrets behind how our digital world operates. Start building essential skills to design your own programs and analyse data that makes a difference. Discover programming fundamentals and data analysis techniques as you create engaging digital stories and work with real data. Get ready to make an impact in our connected world.

DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGIES

(Food and Materials)

In Year 7/8, students learn how to safely operate in high-risk communal spaces, including kitchens and textiles rooms.

- **Food Unit:** Students will understand the importance of maintaining a high standard to personal hygiene, develop effective teamwork and organisational skills, and investigate the significance of consuming a balanced diet for good health.
- **Textiles Unit:** Students will identify and correctly use textiles room equipment to develop various construction skills, producing functional textile products.





Academic Excellence Program

The Academic Excellence Program at Clairvaux MacKillop College provides a challenging and enriched learning environment designed to extend each individual to achieve his or her full academic potential.

The Program is a reflection of our Vision for Learning in which the College strives to develop visionary young people who embrace their changing world with confidence and hope. In doing so, they are challenged in their academic endeavours within a progressive learning environment.

The purpose of the program is to further develop the skills and abilities of our academically talented students by providing enriched learning opportunities through extension and acceleration. Its objective is to empower students with exceptional academic ability and motivation, through educational opportunities to access curriculum enrichment.



Students will engage in a variety of stimulating activities through the broadening of the curriculum to:

- encourage the acknowledgement and development of personal strengths and a growth mindset,
- deepen students' knowledge, understanding and skills,
- foster application and high order/critical thinking skills,
- develop self-directed thinking that cultivates innovative, creative ideas and solves problems,
- work effectively and collaboratively in groups to better understand how they contribute to the learning of others,
- develop a better sense of self efficacy,
- promote reflective practices related to learning experiences and processes,
- value and promote intellectual pursuits
- celebrate the joy of life-long learning.

Students within the program are able to work with peers who share similar interests, aspirations and abilities.

In Years 7-10, the Academic Excellence Program is available in two strands:

Strand A

- focuses upon Science, Mathematics, Engineering, Technology, Aerospace, Design and Health

Strand B

- focuses upon English, The Arts and Humanities (History, Geography, Business and Law).

Students are invited to apply for one strand each year, in response to their talents and interests. Changing from one strand to another during the year is not possible.

Applications for the 2027 Academic Excellence Program will close in Term 4 2026. Advice about this program will be sent via email at the beginning of Term 4.

Service and Community

Interact

The Interact club is a social justice group that is closely tied with Rotary Mount Gravatt. By joining this club the students become a part of a special network of dedicated volunteers who are connected through joint action for those in need. This unique relationship allows students special access to Rotary projects such as exchange and experience programs.

Students meet every second week to organise awareness campaigns throughout the year. Events that the students have pioneered include: Appreciation Day, Interact Day and countless BBQ's and bake sales.

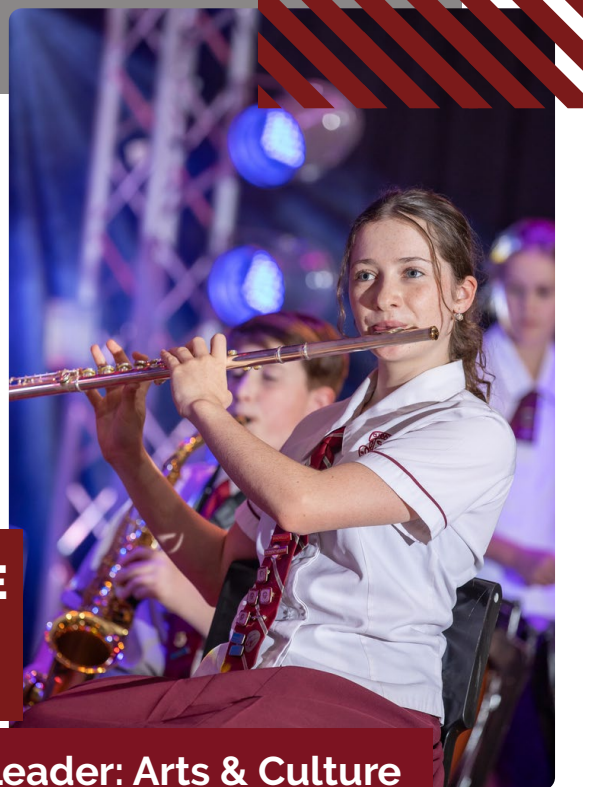

Parent/Caregiver Information Evenings

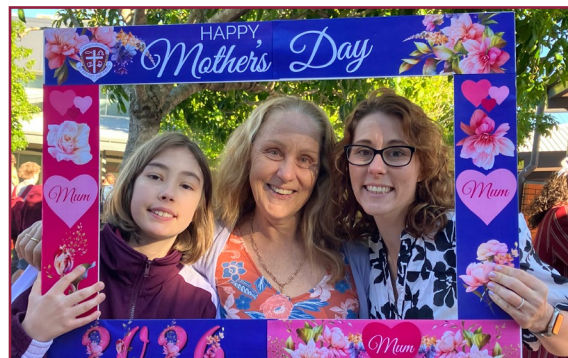
Parent/Caregiver Information Evenings address specific aspects of the Year Level.

There are two evenings during the year that provide parents/caregivers with the opportunity to meet together with the student and the subject teacher. During this interview a student's individual progress is discussed, as well as strategies to encourage greater success.

Interviews are arranged through an online booking process and information will be sent home prior to the evenings.

College Board

The College Board does not represent individuals or groups, but provides consultative and collaborative support to the Principal and the College.

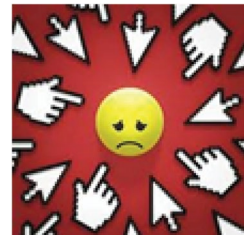
The College Counsellors provide valuable support to our students, staff and families. Appointments to meet with the Counsellors can be arranged as necessary.

Student Uniform

Uniform Policy

Clairvaux MacKillop College has a uniform code and expects all students to wear their College uniform with pride. Our expectations are:

1. The full and correct uniform is to be worn between home and school at all times.
2. Uniforms are to be clean, pressed and in good condition.
3. All items of uniform should be clearly and permanently marked with the student's name.
4. School shoes should be clean and polished.
5. Students who would like to request adjustments for cultural or religious reasons, are welcome to do so with prior approval of the principal.

If there is a genuine reason for a student not wearing the full and correct school uniform this should be noted by a parent/guardian in the diary and contact made with the relevant Homeroom Teacher or Pastoral Leader.

Hats

The College formal hat must be worn to and from school, and during the day when moving around the College and during breaks.

The College sport hat or cap is to be worn when students are playing sport, during HPE lessons.

Hair

- Hair is to be of conservative style
- Hair is to be clean, neatly styled and not on the student's face
- Hair beyond the collar should be tied back - half up half down is acceptable
- Hair is to be of a natural colour
- Extremes of hairstyle are not permitted, including rats tails and mullets
- Closely shaved hair (blade one or two) is not permitted
- Hair ribbons are to be in the College colours (maroon and white); other hair fasteners are to be unobtrusive.

Facial Hair

Students are to be cleanly shaven and not present to school or College events with facial hair.

College Bag

A College bag is to be used.



Make-up

Sun safety is important in Australia. Students are encouraged to wear traditional sunscreen for sun safety. A fine and natural coverage of tinted moisturiser/ sunscreen, or a mineral foundation with high SPF is permitted.

Students are not to wear any other type of makeup including: eyelash extensions, mascara, eyeliner, eyeshadow, blush, lipstick or highlighter.

Jewellery

The following jewellery items are permitted:

- A Christian religious symbol on a chain - both symbol and chain are to be conservative.
- Students may wear one pair of earrings in the earlobe only. Plain sleepers or small studs less than 5 millimetres in diameter that are safety compliant and in gold or silver are permitted.
- Clear retainer/studs may be worn.

The following items are **NOT** permitted to be worn:

- All other jewellery or fashion accessories
- Nail polish, shellac and coloured acrylic nails
- Stick-on lashes
- Tattoos
- Eyelash Extensions
- Facial piercings

Wearing of the Winter Uniform

College Blazers are an expected part of our winter uniform. All students are expected to wear their blazer to school in the winter terms, Terms 2 and 3.

- All students will be expected to be in their blazers for:
 - Homeroom uniform checking (Term 2-3 only)
 - All full College assemblies – 3 per term (Term 2-3 only)
 - All school excursions with formal uniform (Term 2-3 only)
 - Any awards ceremonies where formal uniform is required (**Term 2-4 only**)
- After homeroom, students may choose to continue to wear the blazer or the College approved jumper or both.

Additional points of information:

Uniform Variations

Some students are eligible to wear variations on the above uniform schedule. This occurs only with the prior formal approval of the College.

Wearing of the Sports Uniform

Winter Sport Uniform Options

The College tracksuit is optional wear as a sports uniform item. Tracksuit items cannot be worn with the formal uniform.

College Sports Jackets

Students only may wear the College sports jacket with their sport uniform. Sport Team Jackets can only be worn with the College Sport Uniform.

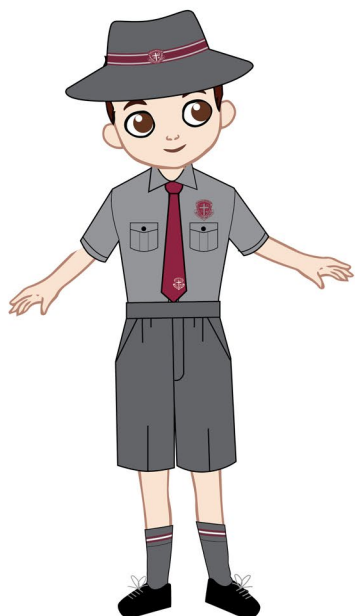
Clairvaux MacKillop College communicates its Student Uniform Policy to students and parents/caregivers via the College website, Parent Portal and the Student Diary.

The correct wearing of the uniform is included in the College's Behaviour Matrix under the sections **We Are Respectful** and **We Are Responsible**.

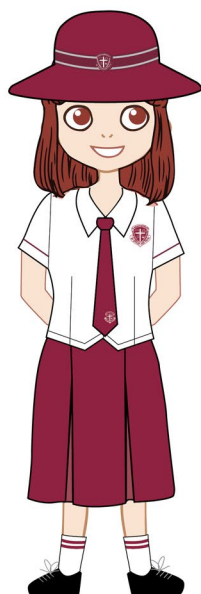
Students are regularly reminded of the Student Uniform Policy through:

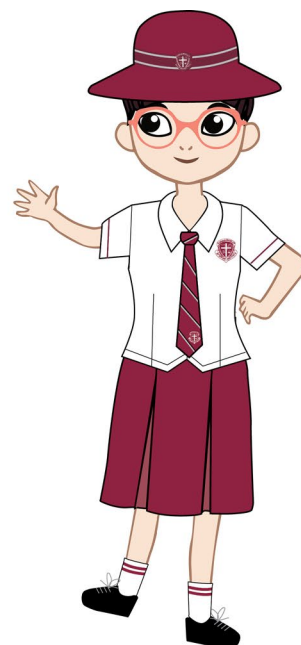
Boys Uniform Years 7-8

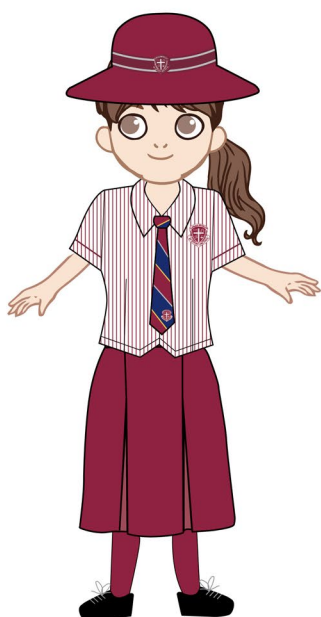

Things to Note

Assemblies

There are three types of assemblies that Year 7 students will experience. These include: Year Level Assemblies, College Assemblies and House Assemblies.

Attendance

If a student is absent for any reason the College office need to be notified by 8.30am that morning. Parents/caregivers notify the College of a student's absence through the BCE Connect App or BCE Connect Online via the Absence tab. Parents/caregivers do not need to contact the student's Home Room teacher directly. However, if the student has an ongoing illness, please discuss the matter with the student's Home Room teacher.

During Home Room in the morning the student's name will be marked on the morning roll and if a student is not present and the College has not heard from the parent/caregiver before 8.30am an SMS message will be forwarded to the parent/caregiver via the mobile number provided on enrolment. The Student Attendance Policy can be accessed on BCE Connect Online, BCE Connect App and College website.

Requests for Extraordinary Leave

Students have considerable holiday time across the year and are expected to attend school during term time. Requests would be in the most exceptional circumstances. To notify the Principal of the additional absence from school, an Extraordinary Leave form will need to be completed and sent to the college. You will find this form on the BCE Connect App and BCE Connect Online. Ensure to allow adequate time to have this request assessed, especially with reference to assessment. AARA (extensions) are not granted for extraordinary leave. If you are thinking about this type of request, it would be recommended to contact the college to know more about impacts on student learning and assessment before making any official plans or bookings.

Late To School

The College understands that sometimes there can be bus difficulties or a mishap at home (that all families may experience at one time or another). If a student is late to school they must report to the office to be signed in. Again, this should be a rare occurrence.

Media Consent

Each year we collect digital, photographic, and multi-media images of student materials for a wide range of reasons, including for display and promotion. Before using any images we need consent from parents/carers. Our Media Consent form will be given to your student on Orientation Day and we ask that you complete and email to mediaconsent@cvxmck.edu.au by Wednesday 25 November 2026.

ID Card

Each student will receive a photo-ID Card by approximately Week 3 of Term 1 which they must always keep with them. The ID Card is required to access the library, text books, CMC Connect services, tuckshop and uniform shop.



Lost ID cards will need to be replaced, at a cost, through the library.

College Payment System

The College has a cashless purchasing system called **My Monitor** which is linked to the student ID card. This means that students who wish to purchase items from the Uniform shop and /or the Tuckshop need to have money added to their student card to pay for these items.

Parents/caregivers will be able to use their credit card to place money onto their student's My Monitor account that can only be accessed by parents/caregivers and students, and spent only within the College. Parents/caregivers can see the account balance, and get statements at any time by visiting the College's Monitor website. Students will also be able to add money by using an Eftpos card at the kiosk that has been set up outside of the F Block Staff Room.

Further instructions on how to use My Monitor will be sent to families, once ID cards are available early in Term 1. Please do not try to set up your My Monitor account before being notified to do so by the College.

Tuckshop

Our tuckshop offers a range of hot and cold foods from pies, sausage rolls, burgers, lasagna, garlic bread and butter chicken to sandwiches and salads. Drinks, chips, chocolates, brownies, ice blocks, fruit salad and yoghurt are just several of the other items available.

Preordering via my monitor for food purchased at the tuckshop is recommended. Otherwise, students can place orders before school for both breaks or purchase a more limited range of food during the break time. Students who have preordered are served first.

Until student ID cards are received (approximately Week 3 of Term 1) Year 7 students will only be able to access tuckshop by ordering at the tuckshop before school and using eftpos facilities. As soon as ID cards are received, parents/caregivers will be able to activate the online system and add funds to their student's account.

Lockers

All students store their belongings for the day in a locker that is assigned to them on the first day of school. Some things students and parents/caregivers need to know about lockers include:

- Students will be provided with a locker and a lock. The Home Room Teacher or Pastoral Leader may move the student's locker if needed.
- The student's bag is placed in the locker immediately upon arriving at school; no bags are to be carried around during the school day.
- Cleanliness of the locker is the student's responsibility; keeping it clean will help with organisation.

Security of lockers is a shared responsibility. As a College we provide a secure facility. Students should not allow other students access to their locker for any reason.



Personal Digital Device (PDD) Policy and Procedure

Personal Digital Devices include but are not limited to:

- Smart phones
- Wireless accessories e.g. Air pods
- Smart watches



Students who bring a personal digital device to school must abide by the following expectations:

1. These devices are not to be used between a student's arrival time at school and the end of the school day (2.55pm).
2. These devices are to be switched off and kept in the student's secured locker at all times.
3. Should a parent/caregiver wish to contact their child during the school day, they are to phone the College office with a message which will be conveyed to the student.

Should a student wish to contact their parent/caregiver during the school day, the student is to ask the staff at Student Reception to phone them.

Student Notices

Each morning daily student notices are read out during Home Room by the teacher to inform students of current events and other important information. These are available online 24/7.

The students will need to take responsibility to listen to the information and respond to any actions appropriately.

YAGA - Homework and Tuition Support program

YAGA operates every Monday and Wednesday afternoon, from Week 2 to Week 9 each term, from 3.05pm – 4.30pm in the Library. Students have the opportunity to work on assignments, study for exams and receive additional curriculum support from teachers and support staff.



Library

Our library is open from 7.30am to 4.00pm including each break every school day. Students can use the library for study or to work on assignments during these times.

Stationery

Clairvaux MacKillop College has partnered with Campion Education to provide parents with one place to order all their stationery needs for all year levels. The Year 7 stationery list is below.



Mid Term 4 this year parents will receive information with a link of how they can place stationery orders.

If ordered by the due date, approximately mid December 2026, you receive first choice of availability, most favourable postage and packing costs and delivery will be guaranteed in approximately week 3 of January 2027.

If you miss the due date, you can still order, but postage and packing costs are more expensive.

You can also order online and click and collect from Campion retail service centre in Salisbury or you can visit the store directly.

Enrolment Application and Confirmation Fees

A non-refundable application fee of \$90.00 (GST inclusive) is payable when an application form is lodged.

When an offer of enrolment is accepted, a non-refundable confirmation fee of \$250.00 (GST inclusive) is payable.

Issuing of Fee accounts

The annual fees and levies are billed over four school terms. Invoices will be emailed during week 2 of each term to each parent with fee paying responsibilities. Unless a payment plan has been agreed, payment is expected in full by the due date shown on the account. Please ensure your email details are always up to date, any changes can be advised via BCE Connect app.

Discount for early payment

Families who elect to pay the full year's fees and levies by the term 1 due date, will receive a discount of 5% on the total account. Extracurricular levies are separate to this amount.

Methods of payment

The College offers the following payment methods:

- BPoint, web-based payment facility
- Direct debit – installment scheme payment
- EFTPOS – Debit and Credit (excluding Diners Club and Amex)
- Centrepay via Centrelink

Overdue accounts

Accounts that remain unpaid as at the due date, where payment arrangements have not been instigated, will be pursued.

Outstanding Debts

Payment of all fees and levies takes precedence over payments for any non-core and extracurricular activities offered by the College, such as major social events, overseas study tours, pilgrimages, representative sporting events and the like. Participation in many of these activities, particularly overseas study tours or pilgrimages, cannot occur if school fees are in arrears. Exceptions to the above are at the discretion of the principal.

No refund will be given on the full term's charges, should a student exit the College after the due date for the term's fees (end of week 4 each term).
